# Soaps

I have only just recently found out the origin of 'soaps' for those television neighbourhood series. Did you know it came from the sponsoring in the 1930's of some radio series by Proctor and Gamble, a company that made soap and cleaning products.

I found this bit of information from a possibly unlikely source: an article in the Church Times by a retired Bishop who is an Eastenders fan. Amongst other things he said that the journalists interviewing him after his consecration did not pay much attention when he talked of Jesus and the Church, but pricked up their ears when he said he never missed an episode of Eastenders.

In his article he went back to the time when Dot Cotton, a staunch churchgoer, lost her faith after being mugged. He said the BBC received an amazing number of letters after that, most of which were not from churchgoers. He thought the protesting non-churchgoers fell into a category sometimes called 'believers not belongers'.

I think I know quite a few people like that, and you probably do too. Many people can feel a loose sense of belonging because they support our fundraising. Can we love them into coming that bit nearer?

The Bishop also made the point that we are in church for God who is present and for people who are absent, and he was probably thinking of people in very wide terms.

Dot Cotton recovered her faith – she said she couldn't do without it, 'after the life I've had.'



### Malachi 3:1-5

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

Then I will draw near to you for judgement; I will be swift to bear witness against the sorcerers, against the adulterers, against those who swear falsely, against those who oppress the hired workers in their wages, the widow, and the orphan, against those who thrust aside the alien, and do not fear me, says the Lord of hosts.

### Hebrews 2:14 - 18

Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, he himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the

fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God. to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

### Luke 2:22-40

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace,

according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation,

which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

a light for revelation to the Gentiles

and for glory to your people Israel.'

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. 40The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

# Open My Eyes and Let Me See - Sermon

You've all heard that saying? "All Good things come all to those who wait." Well with that in mind, let's have a look at 'Simeon's' background. Some things you may, or may not know, Some things, that might surprise you.

'Simeon,' is often identified as one of the Seventy Hebrew scholars that translated the Old Testament from Hebrew to Greek! Because of this, Simeon must have been aware of Malachi's prophecy, "The Lord whom you seek, will suddenly come to his temple."

We have been told that Simeon had been promised, that 'he would not die,' before he had seen the Messiah. Simeon had spent a long time preparing and waiting for the fulfilment of the prophecy. Not just a 'few' years, or even decades, but centuries. It's said that Simeon was more than 270 years old! And old age had taken its toll on him when he received Jesu' in his arms. It's not surprising then, that in Christian icons, Simeon is portrayed as a bent over old man. Who was also said to be blind!

Let's now consider this. 270 years old. Blind. What could a 270-year-old blind man possibly see?

Does any of this makes sense! Blind men don't see! Or do they?

So, do we agree or disagree with this. And do we ignore Simeon's words, "My eyes have seen your salvation"? If so, we might as well stop here, and go put the kettle on!

Or does this story help us with our own understanding and insight. Of our own experience with God?

The world around us?

And that of life?

For most of us the world is limited to, the physical, and the sensory. We have come to believe that truth and reality are defined by what we know and understand. More often than not it is determined by our five senses, sight, hearing, taste, touch, and smell.

The gift of sight, or being blind, just don't go together. It doesn't make sense; they are totally opposites. So, does Simeon have sight, or he is blind, which?

What if he has both at the same time?

What if Simeon 'is blind' and 'he does see'?

At some point we have to admit this makes sense

This admission is the beginning of learning to see this in a new light. While we try to make sense of this, and resolve the difference between seeing and blindness, we are missing the beauty, deeper meaning, and encouragement we receive from this story.

The dispute between Simeon's' seeing,' and his 'blindness' is 'not' an issue that has to be resolved, Rather, It's a doorway into another realm. It's the doorway into a life with God.

It's another way of 'being,' another way of 'seeing' another way of 'knowing.' 'Seeing' is far more than just sight.

That day in the temple, 'Simeon' saw past the physical. Physical sight he would have seen Jesus, as a forty-day old baby. But that's not what Simeon says that he saw. He says, "my eyes have seen your salvation."

'Which is it?'

'Is it a baby,' or 'is it salvation?'

This is not just simply another event that happened in history. The presentation of our Lord happens all the time. The invisible is seen, the intangible is touched, the unspoken is heard, the uneaten is tasted, and the odourless is fragrant.

There are times in each of our lives when we catch a glimpse of what Simeon saw.

Think about the time when you thought to yourself, or maybe even said out loud, "I never want this moment to end."

Remember the day when you were so absorbed with other people, or so engrossed in something that you were doing, that you lost all track of time. It's almost like you were living outside time.

Remember the day when you thought, "I just can't do this anymore." "It's too much for me, I can't go on." But somehow you did,' and, you've no idea how. It's those moments you experienced a 'presence' greater than the people you were with.

You heard more than the words spoken in conversation. You felt more than what you could touch.

You saw more than what was in front of you.

You knew there was more going on than the events of that moment.

Regardless of the circumstances, you somehow experienced all was well. Everything was just-right, perfect, and complete. Nothing was lacking. Your life was more than you had ever known it to be.

These are the moments of 'Presentation.'

These are the moments when we see salvation.

These are the times when we know that God is there for us.

Remember the line from our first song.

"Open my eyes, let me see"

Amen.

To the nearest centre of learning, where it will be rendered


Harmless, by experts. Even the simplest poem

(born 2 August 1950) is a prolific English Christian singer, songwriter and worship leader. He is the son of Baptist pastor, M. D. Kendrick and grew up in Laindon, Essex and Putney. He now lives in



Tunbridge Wells and is a member of Holy Trinity with Christ

Church, Tunbridge Wells.

Graham Kendrick has been described as a 'father of modern worship music' whose songs are 'crammed full of poetic, divine, biblical truth' that have 'sculpted a view of God that has impacted generations.'

Shine Jesus Shine, Graham's best known song was written in 1987 and has proved to be enduringly popular not just in the UK but all round the world. It deposed 'Jerusalem' from the BBC's Songs of Praise Top Ten Hymns survey and consistently appears as one of the top songs in the CCL (Church Copyright Licence) chart both in the UK and USA.

In a recent interview Graham said:

"This song is a prayer for revival. A songwriter can give people words to voice something which is already in their hearts but which they don't have the words or the tune to express, and I think 'Shine Jesus shine' caught a moment when people were beginning to believe once again that an impact could be made on a whole nation."



### A question for adults to ask children


### A question for children to ask adults

# Bev's Sausage & Onion Plait

### **Ingredients**

- 1 pack Puff Pastry
- 1 lb Skinless Sausages or Sausage Meat
- 3 Hard Boiled Eggs
- 1/2 packet of Stuffing
- 1 Medium Onion
- 1 beaten Egg for glazing

### Method

- Make stuffing (directions on packet).
- Set oven at 180C/350F or Gas Mark 4.
- Dice and fry onion.
- Mix with Sausage and Stuffing.
- Roll out pastry to 12" x 14" rectangle.
- Spread sausage mix length ways down middle of pastry.
- Chop eggs and sprinkle on top.
- With sharp knife cut the pastry diagonally on either side of the filling in 3/4" strips.
- Brush with beaten egg.
- Tuck over ends, then fold alternative strips of pastry over the mixture to create a rough plait.
- Put on a greased baking sheet and brush with the remaining beaten egg.
- Place in oven and bake for approx. 40 minutes or until golden brown.

### Serve warm with salad or vegetables
